## Outpatient Rehab Now Offered at Crest View

Outpatient therapy services are now available at Fairmount for the first time ever! The brand new Community Rehab Center at Crest View is fully functional and welcoming patients not only from Fairmount's apartments and cottages, but also from the community. The Center opened on April 1 with state-of-the-art facilities offering a full range of outpatient rehabilitation services.

Most people do not give much thought to the accessibility of rehab services until they suddenly need them. Just ask Elizabeth Bell.

"When I first heard of the plans for the new Community Rehab Center, I wondered why they would provide a therapy room at Crest View when rehabilitation services are available just across the street at Wheat Ridge," Elizabeth remembers. "Little did I know I would be the first resident to benefit from the new rehab unit," she adds with a chuckle.

For five years as a Crest View apartment resident, Elizabeth had had no health concerns and enjoyed her totally independent life. As a registered nurse working in Health Care at Fairmount, her focus was on giving aid, not receiving it.

Several months ago, Elizabeth underwent unexpected surgery. As her recovery progressed, she was discharged back to her Crest View apartment with the stipulation that she have therapy regularly. It was then that she learned the value of proximity. Since the new

rehab unit is right off the Crest View lobby, just 14 steps from the elevator, Elizabeth didn't even have to go outside. There was no need to bundle up against the weather or worry about

# Renovations Begin at Wheat Ridge

The major renovation project about to be launched at Wheat Ridge will dramatically increase the comfort of their surroundings for Health Care residents, as well as relocate and significantly upgrade Fairmount's rehab services. What changes can you expect?

## A Home-Like Health Care Setting

Over the next 15 months, Health Care will be totally refurbished, resulting in a new, warmer look and feel. Two sunrooms, one on each floor, will be added where residents and their families can relax and visit together in a quiet place while enjoying Fairmount's panoramic view. All of the common areas in the Health Care section will be given a more homey atmosphere, thanks to the addition of cozy fireplaces, country kitchens, fresh paint, wallpaper and carpeting throughout.

The number of private rooms will also be increased. Each will have a wardrobe and a bathroom with shower, allowing residents the option of a greater amount of personal space.

## Major Expansion of Rehab

With demand outpacing our current facilities, Fairmount will relocate the rehabilitation unit to the first floor of Wheat Ridge

where we can greatly expand our services. When renovations are complete, we will be able to serve the needs of a greater number of residents both short-term and long-term, inpatient and outpatient, with a wide variety of rehab services.

## A Group Effort

President/CEO Jerry D. Lile explains how many of the proposed changes came about: "We certainly have benefited from our architect's experience, but many

of the concepts grew out of meetings with team members and from excellent suggestions received from residents and their families."

As we complete these upgraded environments, we look forward to being able to provide even more of the same compassionate care that has always defined Fairmount. We think you will appreciate our changes!


